## **An Overview**

Community Outreach Programme (CORP) is a non-profit and non-governmental organisation (NGO), registered in 1977 under the Societies Registration Act and Public Trust Act.

Donations to CORP are eligible for Tax Exemption under Section 12A and 80G of Income Tax Act. CORP is FCRA certified by Ministry of Home Affairs and member of NITI Aayog (DARPAN) by the Government of India and also certified by GuideStar India for transparency and accountability.

CORP supports children from diverse situations. From the poorest of the poor to children at-risk, CORP provides education to ensure that they can secure a bright future, and thus we transform their lives. We also work for women empowerment through skills-development training for needy women to foster self-dependency.

**Our Vision**: CORP envisions a society where children and women are dignified and empowered, with respect for their basic rights.

**Our Mission**: CORP's mission is to educate, nurture and protect vulnerable children, empower disadvantaged women and to raise the standard of living for poor slum communities.

#### **CORP's Objectives**:

- To encourage all sections of society, irrespective of religion, caste or economic status, to co-operate on long-term development.
- To empower, train and support local people to take responsibility within their communities.
- To create awareness of self-worth and provide facilities for improving the lives of slum residents.

## **OUR PROGRAMMES**

CORP runs programmes for children, women and communities.

## CHILDREN

### **Creche and Preschool Centers**

We believe that in the early childhood years, we can lay the foundation of a bright future for the young minds. Our creche and preschool centers prepare underprivileged children for mainstream primary school education. We provide quality education, healthcare, nutritious meals, a safe environment and impart awareness on hygiene.CORP aims to raise the standard of living of the slum communities by motivating mothers to work outside their home, knowing that their children are in safe hands and are looked after. During the year, about 1087 children in the age-group from 9 months upto 5 years have benefitted from our 20 Crèche centers.



## **Tuition (Tutoring) Classes**



Many marginalised children fall short in their academic performance, due to various causes like poverty, uneducated parents and cramped home space. We support these children by providing them with complete school supplies, opportunities for exposure trips and workshops, and through afterschool tutorial classes, thereby assisting them to excel in studies. This year, over 300 school-going children benefited from our programme.

## **Community Toy Library**

CORP has a community toy library at 12 of our community centers. These toy libraries provide an ideal space for kids to play with toys while developing important social skills. The children have access to hundreds of toys and games. They learn to share the toys and play with each other. We also have activities to develop reading and writing skills.





### **Career Guidance Workshops**

CORP organised career guidance workshops for 100 poor students who appeared for Std. 10th and Std.12th Exams. These annual workshops develop skills and values, and provide a platform to unleash future potential. The youth were guided through careers, courses, scholarships and various levels of professional qualifications achievable. After completing the training, 100% of the students enrolled for higher education in universities.





## **Street Children Rehabilitation Project**

Street children are among the most vulnerable groups in our society due to limited access of adult supervision, unsafe environments, and lack of access to healthcare or education. Most street kids do not attend school and many work in unsafe, inhumane environments. They struggle daily for survival, and on many nights are forced to sleep on an empty-stomach even as hunger drives them to constantly move from place to place in search of food and shelter. CORP focuses on providing safe care for these vulnerable street children. Each day, about 100 street children are brought to CORP's Street Children Programme.

#### Rehabilitation Centre.

- CORP's centre provides the street children with:
- Bathing facilities
- Clean drinking water
- Nutritious meals
- Quality education
- Access to healthcare
- Protection from abuse and exploitation





## **Differently-Abled Children Project**

Children with disabilities in the slum communities face significant hardships. Often, their families cannot meet their needs because they lack resources or education. Children with neurological problems, genetic disorders, like cerebral palsy, Down's syndrome, Autism, ADHS, Epilepsy and Epilepsy syndromes, metabolic disorders, etc. are provided early intervention services.

CORP works with children who have special needs, with the aim of improving lives by maximising independence through education, healthcare and empowerment. Our programmes are focused on two major aspects of checking the drop-outs and inclusion of students in school education.

In 2018-2019, we supported over 140 special children. In addition we organize vocational training workshops and motivational sessions. A few children also received wheeelchairs and hearing aids.



## **SUCCESS STORIES**

I am Ashish and aged 17 years. I lived on the streets in Mumbai and now I stay with my mother and younger siblings at a railway station. Truly, it is tough living in such conditions. My mother works as a housemaid. Being the eldest son, I felt the need to start working as a newspaper delivery boy, thereby contributing to our family expenses. I very much yearned to study and due to CORP's support, I enrolled in school and I passed my SSC Exam. At present, I am pursuing HSC at a night college. After completion of my studies, I wish to become a photographer.

My name is Ikram and I am 18 years old. My family moved to Mumbai from Gujarat when I was a child. Many years ago, my father abandoned our family, so I had to provide for my ailing mother and two younger brothers. About 7 years ago, a friend informed me about CORP's street children programme and with CORP's support I enrolled in school. I learned English at school and bonded with new friends. This year, I am studying hard for my Std. 10th Board Exam. My aim in life is to continue my education and thereafter I want to become an engineer.

> I am Deepali, aged 20 years. My parents passed away due to ill health when I was very young. Thereafter, my grandmother looked after me and my younger sister. Owing to old age, my grandmother's health was declining and she was unable to take care of us. During this very critical period, I was introduced and enrolled at CORP's centre in Thane. CORP supported me to complete my graduation in BMS with "A" grade. I learned classical dance, craft and painting at CORP. I am very thankful to CORP for all the valuable support and guidance towards enriching my life. My goal is to become an HR Manager and work for a reputed company.

In all this world there is nothing so beautiful as a happy child!

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## **SUCCESS STORIES**



My name is Shrinivas. I was afflicted with polio in both legs when I was one year old, due to abrupt high fever. CORP's differently-abled children project started supporting me when I was five years old. I was provided quality education and healthcare. Furthermore, CORP supplied calipers and crutches thus enabling me to walk. I studied in a special school until Grade 10th. Thereafter, I completed my graduation in B.Com. and MSCIT in computers along with Tally ERP. I am working as an accountant in a reputed company. Thanks to CORP's support and motivation, I have become self-dependent and living a dignified life.

I am Omkar. I am hearing and speech impaired since birth. My mother has been paralyzed for the past five years and unfortunately my father passed away recently. CORP has supported me since I was 10 years old. I am undergoing speech therapy and also received hearing aids from CORP. I enrolled at Lion's Club School where I studied until Grade 10th. This year, I completed my graduation in B.Com. At present I am pursuing a computer course. I am very thankful for CORP's support towards my education and healthcare. I aspire to become an accountant.

## WOMEN

### **Vocational Training & Income Generation Project**

In 2018-2019, over 1000 women enrolled and benefited from CORP's vocational centres. Several women from our tailoring and beautician classes, after successful completion of the training, acquired outside job opportunities in garments manufacturing companies and beauty salons.

In addition to vocational training programme, CORP has in-house Income-generation activities, such as stitching uniforms, bags & soft-toys production and partnering with business entrepreneurs. These programmes are designed to empower women through skill development.

## **SUCCESS STORIES**

I am Vidya Khandagle, aged 28 years old. I completed my education upto Std. 10th. I live with my husband and two daughters in a small rented house at Kailash Nagar in Thane. My husband is a daily wage earner and does not have regular work. I enrolled my daughters at CORP's Crèche and Pre-school programme enabling me to work as a domestic help. At CORP's centre, I regularly attended the parents meeting every month and through these meetings, I was able to attend sessions on the women's empowerment programme. I was motivated to participate and work for Immunisation camps such as the pulse polio camps at CORP center organised by Thane Municipal Corporation. I wished to become a nurse so I pursued a 1 year Bedside Assistant course with CORP's support. At present, I am working with Global Healthcare Hospital. I am extremely happy that my dream has come true solely due to CORP.

I am Asha Sagar, aged 39 years. I joined CORP's livelihood programme in 2014 and became a full-time member of CORP's Women Empowerment project. I gained confidence and developed leadership qualities. I availed of opportunities for developing my personality and learning skills in Tailoring. I also gained valuable exposure by working with varied groups of women within the organization. This year, I had an unique opportunity to visit Rome, Italy and attended a one-week workshop on I Was A Sari project with the brand Gucci. Being a modest home-maker hailing from the slum community in Thane, indeed this was a life changing experience for me.



I am Rubina Shaikh. I reside in Jogeshwari with my husband and 3 children. We hail from a very poor socio-economic background. Owing to CORP's motivation, I completed Vocational training course in beautician at CORP center. Now, I receive orders for beauty parlour services from clients. I am earning a steady monthly income. Also, CORP's crèche programme was a big help for me since while I am at work, my children are cared for in a secure environment, provided education and nutritious meals. I am immensely thankful to CORP for the valuable support and encouragement.

I am Reshma Jadhav, aged 28 years old. I belong to a small village of Satara in Maharashtra. I married at the young age of 19 years but separated from my husband. I then relocated to Mumbai and stayed with my cousin. Later, I was informed about CORP's vocational training centre in Thane where I enrolled and completed tailoring course. CORP supported and assisted me emotionally, psychologically and economically as well. Due to CORP's motivation, I gained self-confidence and became self-dependent. Now, I am working full-time at CORP's livelihood programme. I take-up the challenges of meeting production targets and also undergo training on new products. I had an opportunity to participate in an exclusive studio for I Was A Sari project at the Lakme Fashion Show.

## COMMUNITY

## Family Counselling Centre (FCC)

CORP works with women in the community facing significant issues like abusive husbands, domestic violence, dowry harassment, and more. CORP's Family Counselling Centre provide these women and their families assistance to address their disputes. This year, 142 cases were registered, and 78 cases settled by the efforts of our counsellors and 64 cases are pending.



Our FCC programme is supported by the Maharashtra State Social Welfare Board and Central Social Welfare Board (CSWB), Government of India.

## **Support for Poor Senior Citizens**

The poor senior citizens living in the slums face a life of loneliness. They also lack medical treatment and nutritious meals. CORP works with the less privileged and weak elderly residents of slum communities and provides basic medical care, cataract surgeries and essential rations for their sustenance.

"Getting Senior citizens the proper nutrition they need is one of CORP's primary concerns."



## Healthcare and Nutrition



Over 300 medical camps were organised which benefitted more than 30,000 beneficiaries.



CORP's Healthcare and Nutrition programme focuses on promoting good health in the slum communities. We regularly conduct medical camps & awareness talks with the help of honorary doctors and their medical team, who devote their valuable time and services for the wellness of the poverty-stricken community people. Awareness improves the patient's attitude about detection and treatment of commonly prevalent diseases. In 2018-2019, sessions were organised stressing the importance of Family Planning & Reproductive health, awareness about cervical cancer. In addition we organized vision check-ups and provided free spectacles to children and senior citizens as required.

"SWACHATA ABHIYAN" was implemented in different areas towards spreading awareness on cleanliness and hygiene.
